Here are some activities for you to try at home – if you would like. They are just ideas and we would love to see in Tapestry any activities you have fun trying out.



Get out in the great outdoors.



You could go on a walk and look for some of our amazing British wildlife or for signs that they have been around! Take some photos or draw some pictures to show what you found. Bring them in we would love to share them!

Make a cosy den for an animal to live in. What will you use to help keep them dry and warm? Is it camouflaged?

Write your name or a secret message in the ice, what will you use to write it?

Think of one of your favourite fairy tale characters. Can you make a home for them using a shoebox or cereal packet? To make it easier, turn it inside out and stick it back together before painting, colouring or collaging it.

We will be learning about odd and even numbers and about what a pair is. Perhaps you could search your house and see how many things come as a pair. You could also count the socks in your drawer and see how many pairs that makes. Let me know how you get on!



At school we will be making some gingerbread men. Perhaps you could make a gingerbread recipe and make some wintery biscuits?



Have a special story time, read some books all about our winter animals or some new traditional tales. You could snuggle under a blanket with a hot chocolate! You could even tell someone in your family a story, you don't need to read the words, use your imagination and the pictures to help you!



Don't forget it is really useful to your learning if you can read through your scheme reading book. Perhaps try drawing a picture and writing a caption underneath, it could be about your book or learning at home. We would love to share it in class.

Use the internet or some books to find out what some of our winter birds are called and what they look like. You could watch and count how many of the different kinds you can see.
