

Key Facts

- In the 20th century men and women were not considered to be equal, this angered some women so much that they took matters into their own hands.
- There were two main groups in the campaign for votes for women, the suffragists and the suffragettes. The dividing line between the two groups were their tactics.
- The suffragettes were frustrated by the lack of progress and non-confrontational approach
 which the suffragists used so they decided to try civil disobedience and direct action, even if
 it meant breaking the law.
- The Pankhurst family led this group of militant suffragettes, Emmeline Pankhurst and her daughter Christabel Pankhurst were at the forefront of the campaigns and were arrested many times.
