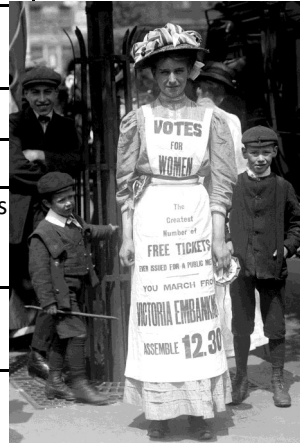

Key Vocabulary

Victorian Era	in British history, the period between around 1820 and 1914.
Women's rights	the rights and entitlements claimed for women and girls world-wide.
Parliament	a formal conference for the discussion of public affairs.
Equality	the state of being equal, in status, rights or opportunities.
Vote	a formal indication of a choice between two or more candidates or courses of action, typically expressed through a ballot or show of hands.
Election	a formal or organized choice, by vote, of a person for a political office or other position.
Government	The group of people with the authority to conduct actions, affairs and policies in a specific country or state.

Key Facts

- In the 20th century men and women were not considered to be equal, this angered some women so much that they took matters into their own hands.
- There were two main groups in the campaign for votes for women, the suffragists and the suffragettes. The dividing line between the two groups were their tactics.
- The suffragettes were frustrated by the lack of progress and non-confrontational approach which the suffragists used so they decided to try civil disobedience and direct action, even if it meant breaking the law.
- The Pankhurst family led this group of militant suffragettes, Emmeline Pankhurst and her daughter Christabel Pankhurst were at the forefront of the campaigns and were arrested many times.
